

**From Chief Troy
Bossman Knowlton**

Oki Piikani,

The days are getting shorter and the leaves are starting to turn. Kids are back at school. Fall is upon us. I enjoy this season, where nature is getting ready for a break while we humans gear up for more work after a summer with some rest.

Unfortunately, this summer was marred by the incident we experienced at the arena. I know we were all saddened that so many people needed treatment after being exposed to carbon monoxide. However, it was heartwarming to see the incredible efforts of first responders not just from Piikani, but from all our surrounding communities. I felt deep gratitude for their incredible efforts and selfless willingness to help. The investigation into what happened at the arena is still ongoing, but results and solutions should be coming soon.

Sincere congratulations to Herman Many Guns who won the recent byelection. One of Piikani's knowledge keepers, Herman has been a councillor before, so we know that we will benefit from his experienced leadership. Welcome back to Council Herman.

While the details are still being negotiated, Piikani's land settlement claim is moving forward. Our team is working hard to ensure Piikani is not shortchanged. While I wish this issue was behind us, the process is a long one involving much discussion, the production of evidence, and procedural delay. Nonetheless, this remains a priority and I am confident of an outcome that will be transformative for our people. I will keep you posted on this.

I spent some time this summer, along with Chiefs from across Canada, speaking out loudly about my concern over Canada's Bill C-5. Bill C-5 would allow the federal government to fast-track some infrastructure and economic development projects like mines and pipelines. My worry is that "fast-track" could mean to proceed without

adequate and legally required consultation on the projects on or near our land. That is not acceptable. The Bill has passed, so we will be watching very closely to see what projects are considered. If the Federal government proceeds on any project without following the required regulatory process, including proper consultation, then we will fight them. Bills like these come and go, but our Treaty Right are forever.

We're working with our partner Hillcore Group on various infrastructure projects now, and initiatives for the future. They are professionals, and our work with them has been of mutual benefit. You will start to see those projects soon.

Our work with the Provincial government on the twinning of Highway 3 is ongoing. Planning studies have been completed, and the province still commits to proceeding with the build.

I hope you have all had a chance to see the new housing being built. While there is more to come, at least 25 units have been approved, with half being near completion. We know that housing is a constant problem – one that your Council and I consider a very top priority. You have our commitment that we will continue to build as fast as we possibly can.

Here is exciting news – we have undertaken a feasibility study on the engineering required to build a bridge across the Old Man River here in the Nation. That bridge would bring our community closer together and transform ease of movement around the Nation. More news to come on timelines and construction details.

Our \$23 million irrigation project is hitting all its benchmarks. You will remember that the project is a 3.5 kilometre waterline and right of way with an inlet pond and settling pond pump station. It connects to the CNID headgates and will dramatically improve our irrigation infrastructure. That will mean enhanced agricultural productivity for our Nation. Also, work on the rehabilitation of the CNID headgates is ongoing.

And lastly, a project I am so proud of. We have completed the planting of 300,000 trees and shrubs in the river valley. A planned combination of Cottonwood, Silverberry, Spruce, Choke Cherry and more will fill out that valley and help restore that habitat to something like it once was. Plots of sweetgrass and mint have also been planted. And that's just the start. Our goal is to plant a total of 1 million trees and shrubs in that area. It will be glorious in a few years.

Best wishes to all the students starting a new year. Thankfully, we are now only a year away from the opening of our new school. What a jewel that will be for the community. Work hard in school, kids. The success of our Nation depends on your success.

As we begin a new school year, PBOES is placing a strong emphasis on establishing positive relationships and creating an environment where trust and collaboration hold great importance. By treasuring the connections we build among students, parents/guardians, staff, and community members, Elders and Knowledge Keepers, we're dedicated to forming a strong support system for everyone.

To actively support this, PBOES is planning community engagement events throughout the school year. - Promote lifelong learning opportunities for adults through various learning opportunities and development of an accreditation plan for PBOES post-secondary services.

- Support and acknowledge Educational Leadership and Business Service Staff as PBOES grows its organization.


in Piikani Nation Schools.

Lands & Environment

Update on Lands/Environment Projects 2025

We are pleased to share with the Piikani Community the completion of projects identified in our previous newsletters and provide updates on ongoing projects. The Lands/Environment Department continues to strive for projects that affect the lands and protect the environment for future generations.

Innii Restoration Project – Herd of 14 at Pens in Haylease

Chief and Council has allocated 1,500 acres of grassland to the Innii Restoration Project to restore damaged grassland due to overgrazing. The area will be fenced off and monitored by Lands/Environment.

Beaver analogs were created and developed with Cows and Fish to restore water in the haylease area. There are currently five beaver analogs on the Nation, all located on the south haylease.

Empower Change and Make a Lasting Impact

TELUS Environmental Solutions has partnered with the Piikani First Nation to restore the Oldman River watershed, home to one of North America's largest and most pristine riparian cottonwood forests. This

area is currently under threat by climate change, erosion, and industrial development.

Key project impacts include:

1. Cultural preservation: Restore lands for Piikani Nation's traditional practices and heritage.
2. Biodiversity protection: Safeguard endangered species and promote ecosystem health.
3. Climate mitigation and adaptation: Reduce environmental risks and enhance carbon storage.
4. Community engagement and employment: Create employment opportunities for Piikani Nation members with sustainable economic benefits.

Voices from Piikani Youth

This project builds on the first Piikani Stories of Resilience initiative in partnership with the Resilience Institute and the Canadian Red Cross.

The stories include youth who were eager to share their perspectives through storytelling and art. Banners will be displayed at the Piikani School, and booklets were produced for families.

Monitoring Change – Inspired by the Piikani Winter Count

This program is part of a larger project called supii po'omaaksin (“in the spirit of planting seeds”), a long-term partnership to strengthen Piikani's resilience to climate change.

Through this program, knowledge holders came together to learn about monitoring from both Western science perspectives and the Blackfoot traditional way of recording history, known as the Winter Count.

Two very important parts of Piikani culture – Innii (buffalo) and Sweetgrass – are at the heart of the program. By developing monitoring techniques, Piikani Nation will be better able to make informed decisions about nature-based climate adaptation strategies.

The program also helps Nation members explore how traditional plants might help fight climate change by storing carbon in the soil.

CARING FOR YOUR CARDIOVASCULAR SYSTEM

Your cardiovascular system is made up of your heart, blood, and blood vessels. It is responsible for pumping blood throughout your body, delivering oxygen and nutrients to your cells and carrying away waste.

Factors that can improve cardiovascular health:

- **Stay Active:** Incorporate walking, strength training, or other physical activity several times a week
- **Eat Well:** Focus on fruits, vegetables, and high-fiber foods.
- **Manage Stress:** Practice relaxation and coping techniques to keep stress in check.
- **Regular Check-Ups:** Visit your doctor yearly and monitor your blood pressure.
- **Avoid Commercial Tobacco:** Quitting commercial tobacco improves heart health (traditional tobacco use for cultural purposes is acceptable).

Public Works

Due to environmental climate change Public Works is currently doing an engineering consultant report on a comprehensive stormwater management and drainage infrastructure of flood basins throughout the Piikani Nation. The stormwater and drainage assessment will focus on the townsite and associated stormwater infrastructure. The assessment will evaluate the condition and capacity drainage infrastructure patterns and identify its ability to protect buildings and other critical infrastructure during heavy rainfall and major runoff events.

The flood mapping assessment will review rural drainage throughout the Nation and complete a flood analysis of seasonal and permanent water bodies; Oldman River, creeks, streams and livestock watering storage dams. The mapping will assess the capacity of rural drainage culverts and roadway ditches to accommodate high stream flows and identified areas at imminent risk.

The Nation has faced challenges in the past related to stormwater runoff and a number of historical Oldman River floods. This is evident based on the completion of several past reports, including the following:

- 1997 Housing Flooding Assessment
- 2004 Groundwater Quality Assessment
- 2005 Townsite Planning and Drainage Study
- 2009 Dam Breach Flood Inundation Study
- 2013 Riverbank and Highway 3 Erosion Control Study
- 2013 Flood Damage Assessment
- 2015 Flood Plain Mapping
- Current Emergency Operations Plan

These past reports and studies will be identified and utilized in the Flood Mapping project scheduled for completion by March 31, 2026. The completed document will be incorporated into the Community Development Plan, facilitated by the Lands Department, also further enhancement of the Emergency Operations Plan.


